Sixteenth Sunday In Ordinary Time

Burnout. Recent studies suggest that roughly two-thirds of doctors and nurses have signs of it. You probably know what burnout is: long -term stress leading to emotional exhaustion and a lack of a sense of personal accomplishment. Burnout can threaten anyone who tries to seriously serve and love others. How does our faith inform this challenging experience, and how do we find refreshment?

The apostles face something like burnout this week in Mark 6. They are run down from their missionary work, and Jesus says, **"Come away by yourselves to a lonely place, and rest a while."** For them, and for us, it takes humility to intentionally rest. It means the world can go on without us. It stings our pride to admit God is necessary and we are not. Choosing to leave our good work to be with him — whatever the cost — is an act of humble faith. And that trust in God begins to revive us.

But there's more to it. Hilariously, Mark tells us that throngs of needy people find out where the apostles are going and arrive ahead of them. Imagine the exasperation of the burnt-out apostles. "Can we *please* get a minute to ourselves? This is not healthy!" And Jesus seems to *encourage* the boundary violation by telling his frayed followers to feed the crowd. Look: once we move into humble rest, he calls us to *more* work, because we are made for love, not for rest. But Jesus does the vast bulk of the labor. He himself is the one who multiplies the small offering until everyone is satisfied.

What finally gives our heart rest isn't more vacation time. It's experiencing the super abundant generosity of God for us and those whom we serve.

A Message From Fr. Foley

Thank you again for your support in prayer and your patience with me being away with the Diocesan Youth Pilgrimage to Steubenville! Please know that you were kept in my prayers while there. It was a



weekend filled with many, many graces, and even renewal for me in spiritual fatherhood. The theme for this year's conference centered around the truth of John 1:5, namely that Jesus desires us to live in his light, and the darkness of our world, the darkness that surrounds us, the darkness that often penetrates our hearts, is no match for the healing light that Jesus alone can give. What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. (John 1:4-5)

In our readings this Sunday we are going to begin a transition from Mark's Gospel which we have been hearing from all year to John's Gospel, and specifically we will be gifted the rich treasure that is Jesus' Bread of Life Discourse, John Chapter 6. First today, though, we hear a nice set up from Mark 6: Jesus, who is the Good Shepherd, invites his apostles to a time of prayer, rest, and refreshment so that they may continue on the journey having been fortified anew. It is certainly the case that we are in need of this rest with him, too! We are reminded that Jesus' role as shepherd necessarily involves his compassionate heart and the inseparable component of his heart, his desire to teach us and show us the way to divine life. We are to learn from him and be formed by him, and our life as disciples is not just the call to sit back and enjoy the love that Jesus extends to us, but to live from that love and to teach others the fullness of this love, too. His ways are better than our ways.

It can be the case that the more we learn from the Lord, the more we meditate on his words and teachings, the more we might fear all that should have to change in our lives, or that we might be daunted at what following Jesus means for us. It is true, we never should plateau in our friendship with the Lord, there are always new heights to ascend and to continue our growth as disciples regardless of our age or state in life. Our Responsorial Psalm this Sunday is a deep consolation for us in the face of any fears or anxieties in our life that might stir because of this: The Lord is my shepherd, there is nothing I shall want (Ps. 23). Expanding the translation of the original Hebrew there is helpful, too, the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be lacking in anything. The consolation for the one who prays this psalm in faith receives anew the freedom of what it means to belong to the family of God as His beloved child. Our heavenly Father, and Jesus who himself is our Good Shepherd, will provide grace in abundance for all who turn in trust to Him, we need not fear that we will be lacking in anything, nor should we fear that following him will leave us doubting his goodness.
