

From Fr. Brendan Foley

Maybe you are relieved to have come back to Mark's Gospel this week...but maybe keep in mind the many lessons and encouragement that we received from the Bread of Life Discourse over the last several Sundays when we hear Jesus speaking today. In the Eucharist Jesus feeds us with his life, and he is also transforming us into his image, capable of his kind of love, capable of living his law. In our Gospel today, Jesus holds up a mirror for us to help us consider ourselves. Still very true for us today, the things that 'defile' us show up and come out of us in our day to day lives by our choices that lead us away from charity and toward the neglect of God, others, and ourselves. When we regularly are stirred toward our vices, not surprisingly, we quickly see communication in our relationships break down, and likely we come face-to-face with how our words and actions have an impact on those around us.

Jesus might come across as a bit harsh in his interaction with the Pharisees and Scribes today, but there's a major danger in mere observance of the prescriptions of the law without the purity of heart or conversion of heart behind it. Jesus is trying to guard our hearts and our capacity for virtue from corrosion, and it's important that we receive his words with that tone. He deeply desires us to know that the path toward holiness is worth every struggle, and persevering will produce a fruit for us even now that is more valuable than any fleeting pleasure that may try to capture our heart or enslave us. Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. We get him when we open ourselves to follow after him. He gives us the gift of himself.

Many of the things we are asked to do as disciples may sound like difficult expectations, but when we have the eyes of faith to see them rather for what they truly are, they become a 'good' that we actually start to desire. Take for example our 'obligation' to go to Mass on Sundays. If we really consider that our worship and participation in Mass is not so much something we are doing for God—it's definitely not something God 'needs'—but rather something He is desperate to do in us and for us, to nourish us with what we need, I can better receive this in love and then the question becomes, "Why would I ever deprive myself of being there?"

When all is said and done, Jesus desires our hearts. He desires to dwell there, to animate us, to give us life, and to transform us into his life. Jesus quotes the prophet Isaiah as he wakes up the Pharisees, "This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me..." Jesus wants better for us and mere observance of the law without having the disposition of heart to match is simply useless or without effect. Time and again the people of God in the Old Testament were critiqued because there was a shallowness in their offerings. They offered the sacrifices prescribed but they did so in vain, because their actions, their words, and their lives were not in continuity with what the sacrifice and praise truly require. For our reflection today let's consider: "What are the things in my life that are defiling my heart?" and, "Is my prayer life more 'lip service', or am I responding to the Lord with authenticity?"

(Practicing) Catholic -Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman The Word



On November 28, 1981, Alphonsine Mumureke was in the dining room at her high school in Kibeho, a small village in southwestern Rwanda. She heard a voice. It was a woman, veiled and beautiful. Alphonsine asked her who she was. "I am the Mother of the Word." answered the woman.

It was the first appearance of Our Lady of Kibeho, who would return to visit Alphonsine and two of her schoolmates over the course of the next eight years. She left with them an urgent call for repentance, along with a prophecy of the Rwandan genocide that would come to fruition in the next decade.

I have always found it compelling that Our Lady chose to identify herself in this way at Kibeho. The Mother of the Word. A title so simple and so concise, but so heavy with meaning.

"In the beginning was the Word..." says the Gospel of John in its opening lines.

But what is the Word? Is it spoken, or is it felt? Is it seen, written, heard? Is it shouted or whispered? Is it scribbled across pages that will one day dry and disappear? Is it carved into stone tablets, or on the nameplate above a cross? Is it poured over our foreheads? Is it set ablaze in a bush? Is it etched into our hearts?

It is all of these things, yes, but it is more, still. The Word is not something that is merely spoken. It is not merely written. The Word is something that is done. It is something that we must choose to do.

Our Lady of Kibeho lamented that this world "has neither love nor peace." "If you do not convert and heal your hearts, you will all fall into an abyss," she warned.

But how do we convert our hearts? What snatches us back from the brink?

It is the Word, spoken. It is the Word, carried out. Not just one, and not just the other, but both.
