From Fr. Brendan Foley

Let's check in with the Catechism this Sunday..."Where does prayer come from? Whether prayer is expressed in words or gestures, it is the whole man who prays. But in naming the source of prayer, Scripture speaks sometimes of the soul or the spirit, but most often of the heart (more than a thousand times). According to Scripture, it is the heart that prays. If our heart is far from God, the words of prayer are in vain. (CCC2562)



The heart is the dwelling-place where I am, where I live; according to the Semitic or Biblical expression, the heart is the place "to which I withdraw." The heart is our hidden center, beyond the grasp of our reason and of others; only the Spirit of God can fathom the human heart and know it fully. The heart is the place of decision, deeper than our psychic drives. It is the place of truth, where we choose life or death. It is the place of encounter, because as image of God we live in relation: it is the place of covenant." (CCC 2563)

After hearing today's Gospel (Mk. 9:45, 47-48), we might be able to identify Jesus speaking in hyperbole. And while certainly in effect, he is employing a specific rhetorical strategy, there is a literal sense to his words. It is indeed better to enter into eternal life, into heaven, than to go off into Gehenna. This part is literally true. However, the rest of his words have another meaning. We don't have evidence of the apostles or the earliest disciples cutting off their limbs or plucking out their eyes. Why is that? They of course would have fought sin the way we all do.

Realistically the reason the apostles never did this is because they know that sin is not caused by these particular members or parts of our bodies, but rather sin comes from the heart. The eye is not the cause of one objectifying the person, but rather it is at the level of the heart that one does this. The tongue or the mouth is not the ultimate source of gossip or harsh words, but rather they come forth from the heart. The second reading from St. James is again challenging us. He uses the image of corrosion which is helpful. If we think about the various forms of media we consume all throughout the week, are there places where what we consume is having a corrosive effect on our heart? If we take in too much slander or gossip, does that not also eventually form our hearts to do the same? If the eye takes in too many visuals of violence or manipulation of others, does that not also corrode our ability to see beauty or to see others as God created them? Corrosion is something that usually happens subtly over time, but you can also see it and recognize it. It's worth asking ourselves what is corroding our hearts.

What should our response be? Both our psalm and first reading today offers a path forward answer... "The law of the LORD is perfect, refreshing the soul; the decree of the LORD is trustworthy, giving wisdom to the simple." We should strive to meditate on the words and teachings of the Lord—there is true wisdom. And secondly, as Moses implores, "Would that the LORD might bestow his spirit on [us] all!" Invoking the Holy Spirit more and more by simply praying quietly, "Come Holy Spirit" or "Fill me Holy Spirit," we can trust that our minds and hearts will more and more be conformed to the heart of the Lord.

(Practicing) Catholic -**Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman** The Angel in the Marble



If you show up to the gates of heaven completely whole, I kind of doubt you'll be let inside.

I know that sounds pretty awful, because what kind of God doesn't want all of you, exactly as you are? "Be yourself," we tell our kids. "If someone expects you to change to be their friend, you don't want to be that person's friend."

And sure, all of that is true ... to an extent. But I think if we really analyze our closest friendships, we'll see that we have been changed by them. We aren't the same person we were on the day we met our best friend or before we fell in love with our spouse. The good relationships should always change us, form us. They should call us to some higher plateau on the mountain climb that is life. But to be nimble enough for the climb, there will be parts of ourselves that we have to jettison — preconceived notions, prejudices, selfish tendencies, habits that we cling to like a security blanket.

This is how we become who we are meant to be: by discerning what isn't helpful and good in our own nature, and letting it go.

"I saw the angel in the marble," Michelangelo once said of his artistic process, "and I carved until I set him free."

Would it not be a terrible tragedy if we all remained shapeless hunks of marble, untouched by the chisels of experience and relationship, thinking ourselves perfect exactly as we are?

God looks at us and he sees the angel hidden in the marble, imprisoned there by the constraints of earthly life: original sin, the weakness of our flesh, the unceasing enticement of the evil one. He sees past what we need to excise, what we need to lop off, what we need to relinquish. He knows we are greatly attached to every part of ourselves, even those parts that lead us to sin.

He sees more than what is. He sees what can be.
