#### From Fr. Brendan Foley

Before we arrive too quickly at a conclusion that our readings today cause us too much discomfort, we should first remember the Church's role in holding us to the 'highest standards' when it comes to the moral life. Just as any parent is responsible for the forming and nurturing of a child, so too the parent loves the child and desires his or her best fulfillment! There are many categories of vulnerable lives that we must defend, and always from a place of steadfast love: women and children, born and unborn, the sick and the elderly, the migrant and the refugee, to name only a few. So, yes, while we as Catholics meet a lot of resistance on many issues pertaining to life and family, and while many might say our demands of the moral life are high—maybe even extreme—but likewise so it is with the mercy of God. For extreme demands, just as radically extreme is the mercy that God is ready to offer to the one who truly desires it. Jesus chose to go to the bitter pain and shame of the cross, and in doing so he opened his heart that the wellspring of life would pour out on us and on the earth, to free us from the tyranny of sin and death. The fountain of mercy gushed forth from Jesus' heart and we are ever invited to encounter that heart there in the Sacrament of Reconciliation to be cleansed and renewed whenever necessary.

Bishop Robert Barron likes to point out the comparison regarding the Church's 'high standards' when it comes to things like violence or war. While in some areas of life people want to see the Church scale back lofty expectations, likely no one of sound mind and heart would suggest that the Church should scale back her expectations when it comes to peace, protection of the innocent, or the use of chemical warfare, etc in ares of global conflict. As a result, we see how important it is that we, as members of the Body of Christ, stand up for the rights and protections of those most vulnerable **and** that we do so consistently across all stages of life. The Church, guided by the inerrant word of Sacred Scripture and the living Spirit of the Lord, calls us to embody charity in its purest form which comes from no where else but God alone. Jesus has high expectations because he calls us to live *his* level of love—a much deeper, disinterested love, where I care more about 'the other' than I do myself.

How does Jesus love? He holds nothing back of himself, his life is given entirely in love for us. 'This is my body given for you.' When we give Jesus permission to accomplish such a high level of love in us, he makes it possible, and through our vocations and our participation with him, he produces great fruit. So remember that it is worth our sacrifices to love even when it is difficult or unpopular. As Pope Benedict XVI beautifully reminds us, "The world offers you comfort. But you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness." Whenever we settle for anything less than Jesus, we risk damaging ourselves or others and we risk warping our ability to give or receive love. That is a truth that is timeless. Yes, the Gospel has extreme demands, but yes, there's extreme mercy to transform us for what we were truly made for. Jesus needs you and me to enlighten the world and to show to others the 'path of life'. May we always be courageous to place ourselves in service and defense of all life.





# (Practicing) Catholic Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman The Hardness of Your Hearts



As far as I know, no one has ever woken up in the morning, looked out the window, and thought, "This is a beautiful sunrise. I'll have to be very careful not to let it make me happy."

But I'm certain that every day, lots of people — including, on not -infrequent occasions, myself — have woken up and remembered something that happened the day before. Something that made us feel upset or frustrated or insulted. And we thought to ourselves, "That makes me so, so angry." And we've pictured the face of the person who made us feel that way, and we have scoffed with disgust.

And we hold onto that anger because anger feels so much better than sadness. And deep within ourselves, in the place where we feel all the love and pain and confusion that is inherent in human existence, we harden.

Nobody ever intends to be hard-hearted. That's just the stuff of Bond villains and horror flicks. No, in real life a hardened heart isn't a conscious choice. It's a reflex. It's just us trying to protect ourselves, to be strong — or, at least, to embody the version of strength offered by a fallen world.

A heart of stone is not so easily scratched, you see. But it's also not so easily warmed or touched or moved.

A heart hardened by resentment and pain and anger is not just protected from injury. It is protected from the impact of the whole spectrum of tender feelings. It is not open to forgiveness, so it cannot feel the rush of life-giving mercy. It is closed off to new ideas, so it can never feel the awe of discovery.

There is a reason we are called to guard ourselves against hard-heartedness. God gave us hearts of flesh and blood. They are hearts that can be broken, yes — but also, they are hearts that can be made new. ©LPi
