From Fr. Brendan Foley

"Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said to him, 'You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." (Mk. 10:21) Once again our readings this Sunday invite us into the perspective of divine wisdom. This encounter of Jesus with the rich young man is a favorite to reflect on. What is the face of Jesus like in this moment? When the profound detail comes to us that, with a look, Jesus loved him...and then asked the young man to do something he likely could only perceive as impossible.



If we consider that in the list of all the commandments that the man holds up as things he properly observes (also note that Jesus doesn't even refute that he is speaking truthfully about that claim) we would find that there are a couple important commandments missing. The commandments he lists involve his relationship with 'neighbor', he doesn't say anything about the commandments about God. The commandments regarding our relationship with God are first on the list...the neighbor ones come after and flow from our relationship with God.

We can trust Jesus is fully aware of the anxieties deep in this man's heart, his attachments and earthly pursuits, etc., and rather than pointing out what he is "missing" to rebuke him, Jesus touches the part of his heart that is preventing him from being truly free, with the intention of healing and liberating him. Only Jesus knows the deepest longings of the heart and what will ultimately satisfy this. We must work toward embracing this truth in our lives. The man was sad because he had "many possessions"...sounds like this could be any one of us!

We often allow ourselves to define our having "security" in this life as being comfortable with what we have, and specifically what we have now. However, the point of this gospel (and really all our readings today) is that earthly wealth will fade, and though not evil in itself, it is not what we were made for. Anyone who has only sought earthly possessions and security knows well that that quiet anxiety still seeps in deep down. We are never fully satisfied, we are always missing something we convince ourselves that we need, or we are afraid to face life without something or someone. I also really appreciate how Jesus identifies a list of **goods/blessings**, material and immaterial, that are not at all sinful or evil in any way—houses, family members, relationships etc.—these are all good things. However, Jesus offers the divine perspective that there is a wisdom, an interior freedom of invaluable worth, that he longs to give us to prevent us from being too attached even to *good* things. (Side note, having this detachment actually frees us to better enjoy earthly goods and life with gratitude as we are meant to, too, by the way!) We can become attached to obtaining good earthly things with no regard for that treasure which is eternal! If the security of our lives is only grounded in the life we are 'building for ourselves' what kind of a lasting foundation is that?

Our first reading poetically describes this gift of interior freedom, divine wisdom, as something far greater than any riches...but also just as Jesus includes, one who has this gift of divine wisdom, one who is able to 'leave everything and follow Him', even still comes to possess our earthly needs in abundance...amazing! So what is it in your heart that you are clinging to (even if it's a good thing!) that might be the very source of anxiety at the thought of losing it that Jesus wants to come to you with a deeper sense of freedom? How does your life change if the quiet anxieties over health, family, security, etc. were all taken care of? Jesus wants you to look at you, *love you*, and give you the gift of himself, and in him, the peace that will give the heart true rest and trust.

When I was a kid, before smartphones and Amazon, it was the toy catalogs that we waited for.

They arrived in the mail, smiling children's faces splashed across the cover, like a silent promise that real happiness could be purchased within these magical pages. We fought over who got to look at them first. We imagined playtime with this Barbie or that Easy Bake Oven.

Without realizing it, we expected that these toys — and the fun they would create out of thin air, the excitement they would inject into our days — would give us new lives. Make us new people.

The toys we did get were fun enough, but they never made us new people. They never gave us new lives. And before long they broke or needed new batteries. They lost their allure, and they went to the attic. And then, many years later, when we got married or moved houses, we found them, and we sighed — more junk to get rid of.

It's the same now, thirty years later, as much as I hate to admit it. The catalogs have become social media, and the toys have become promotions or pay raises or home improvement projects. I scroll through the feed and my mind lights up. What if we had this? What if we could buy that? What if we could go there?

The rich young man was not sad as he walked away from Jesus because he was losing his riches. He was sad because he wasn't - because he *couldn't*. He couldn't give them up. Such is the dark magic of materialism: it takes hold when you're not looking. He thought he was being a good person and doing good things. But he had given his heart away, and he hadn't given it to God. And now he couldn't get it back.

Whatever of this world we seek to possess — dollars, cars, clothes, prestige — will come to possess us, in the end. ©LPi

WHY CATHOLICS SHOULD VOTE NO TO THE ERA

In November, New Yorkers will vote on the "Equal Rights Amendment," or "Proposition One." This is a dangerous state constitutional amendment that would:

- Enshrine abortion up until birth in the New York State Constitution. Abortion limitations to protect women and children would become impossible to pass. Conscience protections of health care professionals and individuals would also be threatened.
- Allow children to make life-altering medical decisions without parental consent.

Children experiencing gender confusion would be able to seek gender reassignment therapies and surgeries without parental consent or knowledge.

Loosen age-appropriate restrictions. Common sense age-restrictions on "sexual freedom" and the potential "right to die" would be endangered.


The Poverello Health Center at Franciscan Northside Ministries 808 North Salina Street, provides free healthcare and support services to those in need who Poverello




