

From Fr. Brendan Foley

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord...this moment is one of the joyful mysteries of the rosary, and reflecting on this mystery we can recall that "the fruit of this mystery is **Obedience**." So when we reflect on this memory from Jesus' life and the life of Mary and Joseph we are drawn to consider humility of heart before what the Lord asks of us, and what that looks like in each of our lives. We find the Presentation of Jesus to be a **joyful** mystery, though, which might be interesting for us. Why is *obedience* the fruit of reflecting on this moment, and how does obedience lead us to joy? Mary and Joseph were fol-

lowing the prescriptions of the law. They were doing what was expected of them in the eyes of God, every first-born male must be consecrated to God (cf. Leviticus 12:2-8, Ex 13:2,12, 1 Sam 1:24-28, Num 3:47-48). So where is the joy? As we are diligent in striving to live the commands of the Lord, in accepting his invitation to life, we are given the assurance of God's presence, fidelity, and his blessings. The Lord always transforms us through our simple and faithful obedience.

While it might be hidden, this event is overflowing with meaning, and the earliest disciples in the Church loved to ponder and write about it, so much so, that these words of Simeon of having seen the glory and promise of God fulfilled before his eyes (Lk 2:29-32) are prayed EVERY DAY in the Church in the Liturgy of the Hours. In fact, these words are so pivotal that they are incorporated into Night Prayer—what is the symbolism? Among the very last words on one's lips each day is Simeon's response to having encountered the Incarnate Lord and a readiness to pass from this life to eternal life. Beautiful! Simeon's words recognize life as pure gift, and that God is always faithful to his word, and always accompanying us, even if our day doesn't appear to go as planned. So yes, I would very much agree that these words **must be on our lips daily**—even better if they are the last words we say each day, potentially the last words we utter in this life, should we ever go home to the Lord in our sleep.

Consider this reflection from Origen (d.~254) an early disciple in the history of the Church: "Simeon knew that no one could release a man from the prison of the body with hope of life to come, except the anointed One whom he enfolded in his arms. Hence he also says to him, "Now you dismiss your servant, Lord, in peace. For, as long as I did not hold Christ, as long as my arms did not enfold him, I was imprisoned and unable to escape from my bonds." This is true not only of Simeon but of the whole human race. Anyone who departs from this world, anyone who is released from prison and the house of those in chains, to go forth and reign, should take Jesus in his hands. He should enfold him with his arms and fully grasp him in his bosom. Then he will be able to go in joy where he longs to go...

Then he entered the temple—but not by chance or naively. He came to the temple in the Spirit of God.... If you wish to hold Jesus, and to embrace him with your hands, and to be made worthy of leaving prison, you too must struggle with every effort to possess the guiding Spirit. Just come to God's temple. See, you stand now already in the temple of the Lord Jesus, his church. This is the temple built from living stones."

As we come before the Lord into his sanctuary this day to again behold Him, may we respond to his embrace of us and trust that when we are obedient to following in the footsteps of his life, he will lead us safely to eternal life!

Mini Reflection: The oldest trick of the devil is to distract us from thinking about our

hearts. It's not hard for him to do, there are so many other things we could be doing. So, do we have the courage to look to our own hearts, to come face to face with our own choices, our own true selves?

The Thoughts Of Many Hearts

When Simeon cradles the infant Messiah in his arms, he speaks of salvation and glory and revelation. He speaks of his own death. He speaks of the fulfillment of God's promise to all people.

But most memorable, in my opinion, are his words about the hearts of men. This Child, he says, will be the way "the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed."

Perhaps you're like me. Perhaps you don't enjoy scrutinizing yourself, your actions, your intentions. You don't like reflecting on why you feel or react the way you do, and you really don't enjoy measuring those feelings and reactions against what you know they could be.

It's exhausting to sit with God, your heart in your hands, both of us looking at it, talking about it. So far too often, I opt out.

The oldest trick of the devil, you see, is to distract us from thinking about our hearts. It's not hard for him to do. There are so many other things I could be doing, after all. Answering emails. Catching up on laundry. Scrolling Facebook. Worrying about inflation and the election. Stressing about my kid's dance recital and next week's busy schedule.

But where is God truly at work? Where is the place God will point to, when my life pm Earth has come to its close?

It is the very depths of my heart. The place where I am my most authentic self, for better or worse. The place where all my pretensions crumble away, and I am alone with the truth of who I am and what I choose to do.

Be humble, sincere, and entire. These are the chief qualities of a good confession.




God of all goodness,
